Principal's Message

Kia ora parents and whanau

It has been another jam packed fortnight and the hot weather has made this both wonderful and hard work, all at the same time! The pool continues to get plenty of use, although we can't always predict when we will be using it. Please continue to send swimming togs to school each day as we can have all weather conditions in one day, which I'm assured is very typical of this area.

Toroa class welcomed Miss April Bonney at the beginning of last week. She has been observing both Mrs H's teaching and has been gradually taking over the teaching of groups and lessons to ensure a smooth transition for next week. April is a beginning teacher so will be in the classroom for 4 days and I will continue to teach the class one day a week. This is to allow April her beginning teacher release and she will use this time to set up her planning and classroom programmes. Again, I'd like to thank Stef Hole for teaching Toroa during Term 1, we were so fortunate to have her on the team and she ensured Toroa got off to a great start for 2025.

It was great to see so many parents at our breakfast on Wednesday. It combined as a community event and a farewell to Stef and a welcome to April and an opportunity to come into school and chat with other parents and staff. Thank you to our chef Sharyn Smith and Sarah Chann for purchasing the breakfast food!

Two Friday's ago our teaching staff attended the Kahui Ako (community of schools) professional development day on the refreshed curriculum for Mathematics and Statistics, along with all teachers in the Kaikoura area. Many of you may be aware that last year we had no curriculum at all as the one released in 2007 had effectively been replaced with Te Mataiaho – the refreshed curriculum. No sooner did we have our hands on that and begin our training, than it was replaced too at the beginning of 2024. We now still have Te Mataiaho but each curriculum area is undergoing further 'refreshment' and there is a rolling programme of release for these curriculum areas.

Currently we have been given English but only up to Year 6, and Mathematics and Statistics which has been released up to Year 8. Both these curriculum areas have a new structured approach to teaching and this is where the Structured Literacy and Structured Maths programmes are being used.

Teachers are working hard to upskill and plan for the new achievement phases.

Curriculum Level have been replaced by Phases.

Year 1 to 3 is now Phase 1 of the refreshed curriculum Year 4 to 6 is now Phase 2 Year 7 to 8 is now Phase 3

I am in my third decade of teaching and had never experienced not having a curriculum before so, as teachers, we are just happy we have a curriculum to follow! We continue to teach from the 2007 curriculum for all other curriculum areas whilst we wait for them to be released.

I have recently completed some online professional development on neurodiversity. Recently Stuff quoted approximately 320 thousand children in New Zealand are neurodiverse, or one in 5 young people. That means we may have approximately 10 children in our school who perceive the world and feel differently from neurotypical people. Neurodiversity is a description of brain functions and abilities and can be described in simple terms as "brains that are wired differently and have a different way of processing information." ADHD, autism, dyspraxia and dyslexia all fall under the neurodivergence umbrella. Our diagnostics have become much more sophisticated in the last ten years and there are growing numbers of children being diagnosed because of these tools. Teachers also have a much better awareness of what impacts how people function and this information can help us teach children to better understand and accept one another. In recognition of neurodiverse learners, our first mufti day will be held on April 2nd. It is a hoodie/sweatshirt themed and will be a gold coin donation to be sent to Autism New Zealand in recognition of those we work alongside who hold this neurodiverse super power.

sensory overwheim can be a daily experience, at can make everybay acrivines like attending school, going to the supermarket, working in an office or going to a movie feel impossible.

Take the time to view the world through my eyes, and you'll see a place that is both beautifully intricate and overwhelmingly chaotic.

Every sound, every flicker of light, every shifting pattern in the world around me is something I notice, something I feel. The hum of fluorescent lights isn't just background noise—it's a persistent, electric buzz that crawls under my skin. A simple conversation isn't just words—it's a puzzle of tone, expression, and unspoken rules that don't always make sense.

But in that intensity, there is also wonder. I see details others overlook—the way the wind ripples through a field of grass like a whispered secret, or the symmetry in a row of bricks that feels comforting in its order. The world is vivid, sharp, and sometimes too much, but it is also full of moments that bring joy in ways that are difficult to explain.

Viewing the world as an autistic person means experiencing life in a way that is both deeply challenging and profoundly beautiful. It's not about being broken or different—it's about seeing a world that most people don't even notice.

PROCESS TO RECEIVE ASSISTANCE:


- Sports clubs and schools must be registered as a provider with Sport Tasman (see our website)
